The climate in the north of Europe is really dreadful<sup>4</sup>."

Then another drop fell.

"What is the use of a statue if it cannot keep the rain off<sup>5</sup>?" he said; "I must look for<sup>6</sup> a good chimney-pot," and he determined to fly away.

But before he had opened his wings, a third drop fell, and he looked up<sup>7</sup>, and saw - Ah! what did he see?







## Teacher's guide

#### The Author

Oscar Wilde was born in Dublin, Ireland, on October 16<sup>th</sup>, 1854. His father was a doctor and his mother was a writer. Oscar was a very good student. He was clever and he enjoyed writing. He studied at Trinity College, Dublin, and at Oxford University in England. When he finished university, Oscar travelled to London, Paris and the USA. While he was in London, he met Constance Lloyd. They married and had two sons.

Oscar worked as a teacher and also wrote reviews for newspapers. He later become the editor of a magazine. In 1881, Oscar published a book of poems. In 1888, he wrote a collection of fairy tales called *The Happy Prince and Other Tales*. He published his only novel, *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, in 1891 and in 1892 wrote his first play, *Lady Windermere's Fan*. The play was very successful, and Oscar became quite rich. He wrote several other plays, including *An Ideal Husband* and *The Importance of Being Earnest*.

Oscar Wilde died on November  $30^{\rm th}$ , 1900. people still perform and watch his plays today and his stories are very popular. People remember him as a very clever and funny writer.

#### The Plot

When the Happy Prince dies, the people of the town place a statue of him in the center of the city. He always has a smile on his face and this makes the people of the city very happy. But the prince isn't really happy at all. From the top of the column where his statue stands, he can see all the city. He sees many things that make him very sad. He sees how poor and hungry the people are and he wants to help them, but he cannot move. A little swallow, on his way to Egypt for the winter, stops to rest on his statue. They become friends and the bird becomes his messenger and helps the people of the city. One by one, the swallow takes the jewels and gives them to the poor. Soon all the people from the city

have food and clothes and all they have needed. Everyone is very happy, and the two of them remain friends forever in a very special place.
